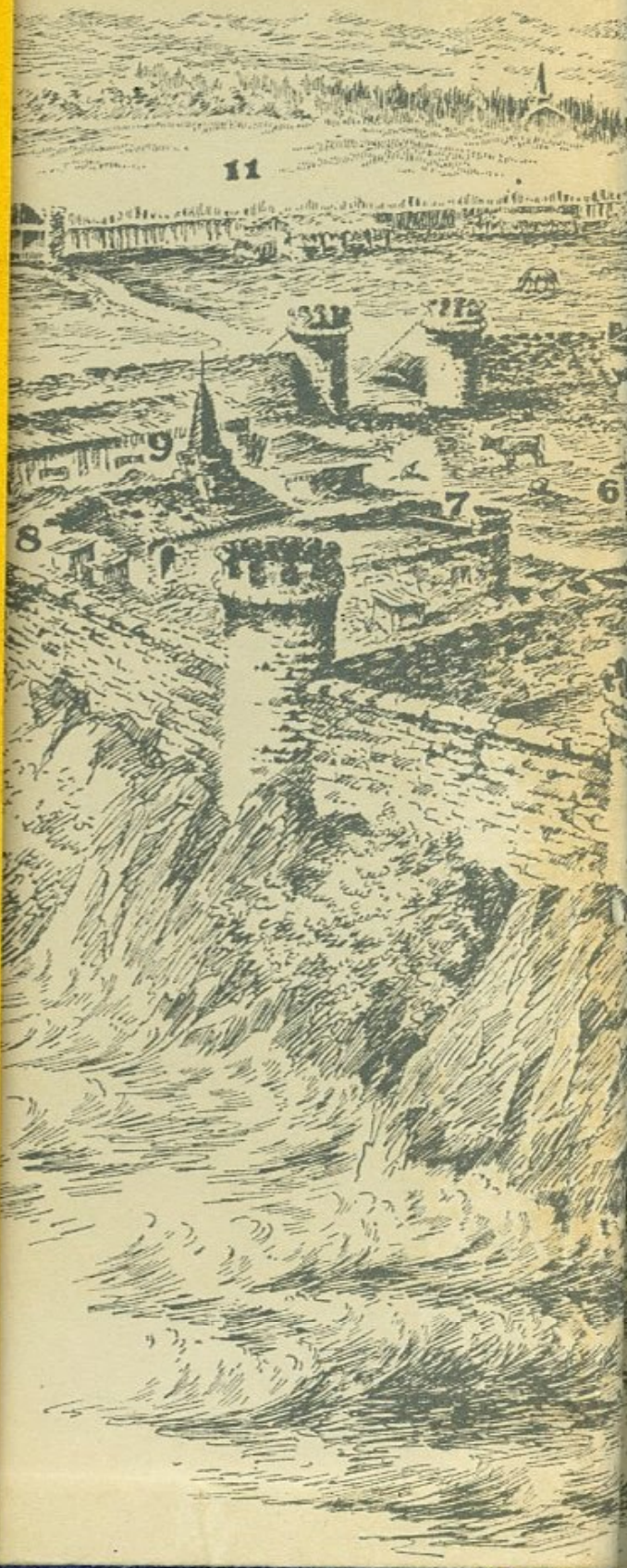

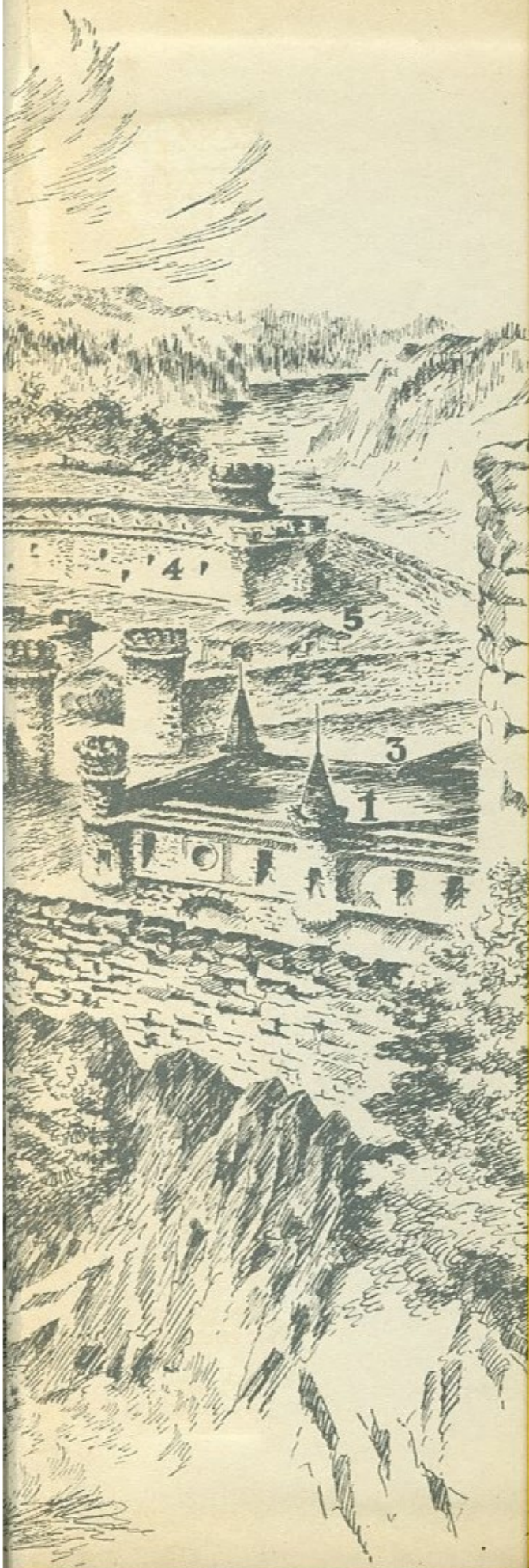
Hugh and Denis, sons of Sire François, the Count of St. Bernon, grow up in a landed castle located in northern France. This fortified stronghold, atop a high, steep cliff, with its moat and drawbridge, its turrets and its large company of servants, knights, and ladies, provides a never-ending source of thrilling adventure for the boys.

Denis, though seven years younger than his brother, is the more mischievous and Hugh is repeatedly called upon to rescue him from some plight or to protect him from real danger. As they grow older they are allowed to go to the fair, they take part in a boar hunt, and Hugh becomes a squire. Finally, after attaining the proper age and undergoing many tests of bravery and skill, he is dubbed knight by the gay young Duke of Tourfière, and at the same time Denis has a big surprise.

The twelve completely charming tales that go to make up the story of Hugh and Denis are filled with material of educational value, and fairly bubble over with good spirits, laughter, and wholesome boyish adventure in a thoroughly romantic and colorful setting. Any boy or girl, aged eight to twelve, will revel in this book.

HUGH AND DENIS is Miss Edna Becker's first published book, although some 150 of her short stories, poems, and articles have appeared in magazines since she began writing in 1926.

Two of the stories contained in HUGH AND DENIS originally appeared in *Child Life*, and one of them was included in Appleton's *Blue Ribbon Stories*, the best children's stories of 1929. "Names" was published in *Boys and Girls*. With those exceptions, the tales in HUGH AND DENIS have never before appeared in print.

The book is illustrated with a beautiful drawing of the castle grounds by R. H. Hall and several delightful sketches of scenes from the book, by Keith Ward. These twelve connected stories of two boys of the middle ages will, the publishers predict, take a place in juvenile literature comparable to that held by the works of Jeffery Farnol in adult fiction.
